Catalog Course Description: Topics in Literature will examine a body of literature that addresses a common topic or theme, represents a particular genre, derives from a specific region, stems from a particular time period, or represents a cultural identity. Readings will include a range of authors and perspectives on the topic and will be examined in their cultural contexts as well as through close reading.

- 2. Students will apply literary terms and definitions appropriately.
- 3. Students will use the technique of close reading in the analysis of literature.
- 4. Students will demonstrate knowledge of different literary periods, their historical and social backgrounds, individual authors and their creative process, stylistic trends, and/or influence on the field of literature.
- 5. Students will explore the value, timelessness, universal truths, and/or global nature of literature.
- 6. Students will write coherently about literature, providing information from the text(s) to support their reasoning.

**CLO Assessment Methods**: Instructors will choose from assignments that will include a combination of written assignments, quizzes, workshop/peer review and final portfolio.
