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Congressional earmarks to benefit Mid-Ohio Valley projects

PARKERSBURG — The federal omnibus spending bill passed at the end of 2022 contains millions of dollars in earmarks for projects in the Mid-Ohio Valley.

Among those is an effort to redevelop industrial sites in Parkersburg, particularly in the areas of Depot and Jeanette streets, East Street and Camden Avenue, according to a list of earmarks provided by the office of U.S. Sen. Shelley Moore Capito, R-W.Va.

A release from her office said she secured spending for the projects, some of which were also advocated for by U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., and/or former Rep. David McKinley, R-W.Va.

Lindsey Piersol, executive director of Wood County Economic Development, said she hopes to make it a public-private partnership where properties are acquired, cleaned up and reused or replaced.

"We're on step one of many," said Piersol, noting an additional \$900,000 in federal funds have also been allocated to the effort. "Our goal is to clean up and revitalize and bring good-paying jobs back to Wood County."

West Virginia University at Parkersburg will receive \$596,000 to develop a program to retrain workers that will serve as a template for the other eight community and technical colleges in the state. The funding will include mobile training labs for the participating schools, said interim WVUP President Torie Jackson.

"We're looking at creating the model for incumbent worker training," she said. Jackson said federal officials took note of a program WVUP established with Chemours to help their employees get two-year technical degrees.

"They wanted to see more of that continuing in the Mid-Ohio Valley and throughout the state," she said. "We're looking at creating the model for incumbent worker

PARKERSBURG — The next president of West Virginia University at Parkersburg will be someone who will want the job for the next 99 years and beyond, said one of the consultants who will be looking at applicants for the position.

Jerry C. Hunter Jr., of Academic Search of Washington D.C., addressed the college's Board of Governors Tuesday during its regular board meeting.

Hunter will be meeting with people at the college today to see the qualities they are looking for in a college president, including staff, students, faculty, the administrators as well as members of the community.

"I am gathering information while I am here to confirm the profile of the college and university here which is very impressive," he said. "What everyone really wants is someone who wants the job.



"A lot of people apply for jobs. I have a list of 32 people that apply for every job that comes open. We are not really interested in those people. We look for people who want 'this' job. They have a passion for this place and this culture and the mission and goals and dreams of this school."

Former University President Chris Gilmer resigned last summer to become President at West Virginia University Potomac State College in Keyser, W.Va.

Torie Jackson was named as the interim president. She has had many leadership positions at the university with the last being Chief Operating Officer, Executive Vice President for Institutional Advancement, President and CEO of the WVU at Parkersburg Foundation, and as an Associate Professor of Communication.

Jackson recused herself from the presentation as she has expressed interest in the permanent position.

Search Committee Chairman Joseph Oliverio said they will be getting together in the next week or so to draw up the official job description for the position. The Board of Governors will meet, via Zoom, on Jan. 31 to officially approve the job qualifications and job description.

Once that is approved, Hunter will then move forward in advertising the position all over the country. They will see if the applicants meet those requirements.

"The next president of the school needs to be a relationship builder," Hunter said.

"The president will build relationships with everybody.

"We want to get someone who really wants this job."

They are looking for someone who can commit to 99 years, he said with a laugh.

The process is expected to take a few months with the search committee having access to all of the applications. Through that, they will start to draw up of a potential list of semi-finalists, based on Zoom interviews, and eventually finalists who will be brought in for in-person interviews.

"We will follow a schedule and you will be proud of what you have done," Hunter said.



"You won't have any doubts about it.

"The most important decision board members will ever make is selecting the president. You want a president you can trust."

Hunter said there could be applicants that don't meet every requirement set forth, but could have something to offer. He called such people a *"diamond in the rough."*

The person they want is the person who wants the job and wants to make the commitment, he said, adding the candidate's family also has a stake in the decision and the board has to be mindful if the applicant's family also wants to be here.

"You need to involve the family in some of these discussions," Hunter said. "The president's job is 24/7. It never stops."

Oliverio said they are looking at having a president named sometime in May so the person can be in place and ready to start July 1.

The search committee will meet March 13 to evaluate the first applicants. They will meet in April to select the semi-finalists. In the first part of May they will have a list of finalists they will bring in for in-person interviews.

"The goal is to have (the Board of Governors) meeting in May to approve the president," Olverio said.

WVU-P president speaks on the senate judiciary passing a campus carry bill

PARKERSBURG, <u>W.Va</u>. (WTAP) - The Senate Judiciary Committee advanced a bill to the Senate floor on Thursday, January 19 that would allow the concealed carry of handguns on the West Virginia higher education campuses.

Dr. Torie Jackson of WVU-P says she hopes to see the handgun aspect of the new bill to continue on if it is passed through the senate.

Certain areas of campus would still not allow handguns to be brought into those areas on the campus.

" They have provisions in this bill that allow for a lot of exclusions. For example, someone who has a lab that has a lot of chemicals... for someone who is receiving counseling and if someone has a sole office they can say they don't want a gun in their office," said Jackson.



With the bill passing through the senate judiciary many on campus were concerned about the learning of the students. Dr. Jackson said she does believe it will have some impact on the learning for those who are against the concealed carry.

"So we are in a learning environment where many different perspectives come together and there are some people who do support campus carry and there are some people who do not support campus carry. So it could make other people uncomfortable and yes we do expect that it could have some sort of impact on the education that occurs in that classroom," said Jackson.

Long ago and far away on the road to Damascus, Mississippi, about which most of you have heard me speak with joyful reverie, my Papaw Carlton said these words to me: "Son, you are going to be the president one day, and when you are, remember what I taught you. Well, Papaw, here we are again, and I am deeply humbled that my life seems to have come full circle in a place similar in so many ways to where it started. PARKERSBURG — Community members gathered at the Historic Oakland Estate on Monday for the History Loves Company Open House held by the West Virginia University at Parkersburg Foundation.

The foundation has held open houses in the past, but this was the first one inviting others in since the COVID-19 pandemic. There was a larger than expected turnout, according to Olivia Reeder, director for WVU-P Foundation.



"There was way more than I thought would be here," she said. "This has been fantastic, beyond what I had planned."

Reeder offered tours of the home to several groups during the event, showing off the kitchen, dining room, smoking room and four of the bedrooms. She shared stories of Oakland's past, its relation to the Kentucky Derby and the Civil War, and how it was occupied by soldiers and generals during that time.

Gary McDonald and other members of the Mid-Ohio Valley Relic Recovery gave a presentation on relics that were found on the property during a recent metal detecting dig in November. McDonald displayed two relic cases featuring various items found during the dig.

One of the two relic cases held coins from the late 1800s and early 1900s, buttons and weights. The other case contained relics like knives, lantern tops, keys, trinkets and bells.

"Oakland has always been an integral part of the community and the family has always wanted it to be open and receptive to the public," said Reeder. "It's a beautiful piece of history that we're so lucky to have. It's educational, it's a place for fellowship and we're just very excited that we have this opportunity."



The home has been taken care of by the foundation since it was received as a gift in 2015, said Reeder. The foundation uses it as a fundraising tool and a community area. Reeder said some of the donations also help fund the foundation's West Virginia Day celebration, as well as the Annual Kentucky Derby Party, both of which are held at Oakland.

Reeder said donations are integral to the house's upkeep, as it is an older home that has the same needs as a regular house, such as utility costs. She said they will do what it takes to keep the home in its glory. Reeder said there are no plans for a renovation at this time, as it is where it needs to be. She said its purpose is serving the community. *"So we just hope we can keep doing that,"* she said.

PARKERSBURG, <u>W.Va</u>. (WTAP) - Over the past 191 years Parkersburg has grown and developed around Oakland Estate.

Earlier this week, WVU at Parkersburg Foundation opened up the home to the public. Now, people can take classes and tour the family home.

For this week's This Is Home WTAP goes inside the home and steps back in time to learn more about this piece of local history.

"People should know their history and this is part of our history as residents of Parkersburg, WV," Olivia Reeder, WVU-P Foundation Director.

Oakland Estate was built by James McNeil Stephenson back in 1832 and took 6 years to complete.



Reeder explained that before James McNeil Stephenson found himself in politics, he was a local tanner. She said he sold his tannery to Henry Logan, another prominent man in the Mid-Ohio Valley.

Reeder says at the height of the home there were three sisters that lived there, and it wasn't uncommon for 15-20 people to come for Sunday dinner, drinks, and games.

"It was always the place for people to gather and have events and be together in fellowship and it was always used for good and that's something we hope to continue and for us having such a monumental historical piece in the middle of Parkersburg is a really big deal and we're really lucky to steward that type of home," Reeder said. The estate was gifted to the WVU at Parkersburg Foundation in 2015.

Reeder explained that the original Oakland Estate spanned all the way to the YMCA... but the land was donated to create the City Park and Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

"It's just the idea of bringing the foundation out into the community and like I said we're right in the middle of Parkersburg. So, we're just trying to go where the people are."

With the house being a part of Parkersburg for 191 years and seeing so many people enter its doors, there's a lot of history in the home and on the grounds.

Reeder said that many items were found on the grounds.

"So we did recently have Mid-Ohio Valley Relic Recovery here and they were able to find a lot of really cool stuff that was just buried outside on the grounds. So there's some horseshoes, bells, I actually think this piece is very cool."

All the antiques came with the home or where donated back after the Foundation acquired it. Reeder pointed out several items of interest.

Including original wallpaper.

"... It was hand painted and it tells the story of... basically of James McNeal Stephenson's life and how he went from being a tanner to a wealthy estate owner."

"...This has been in the family for years and years and years. But the really cool thing is that it was papered with really old newspapers. If you get down in there with the right light, you can tell that they're extremely old.

And bed frames.

"...we're certain one of three in existence. There could be more, but we know of three. And this was actually created from the oaks on the property." The other two are with family.

Reeder says it's important to preserve these historical places for future generations.

"There are a lot of places in Parkersburg that are very historical and there's a lot of places in Parkersburg that we've lost already that are very historical so we really need to be good stewards and respectful of what we have left because this really is a gift to our community and we need to respect that and honor that and make it a place where people can feel welcomed and inclusive and that is what we're trying to do at the WVU at Parkersburg Foundation."

Chris Gilmer has been interim president of Potomac State since leaving WVU at Parkersburg in June 2022 where he was president for four years. Torie Jackson was named interim president and a search for a new president is underway by the college's board of governors.

Gilmer is a first-generation college graduate, published author and advocate for underserved students.

Gilmer, named the interim president at Keyser in April 2022, will begin his new tenure immediately.



"It is with great humility and a sense of gratitude and collaboration that I embark on this new journey," Gilmer said. "It took me about one minute to fall in love with this place and its people, and to see both the outstanding accomplishments of the past and present and the wondrous promise of the future."

"We have full faith in his ability to lead Potomac State College into the future through his service leadership and deep understanding of underserved populations."

The WVU-P Board of Governors met Tuesday, via Zoom, to approve the 17-page "West Virginia University at Parkersburg Presidential Profile."

"(The next president) will be a visionary, politically astute, and collaborative leader who desires to make a long-term commitment to the college and the communities it serves," according to the profile.

The profile was compiled following recent meetings with Academic Search of Washington, D.C., who will be conducting the search. The meeting included university



staff, students, faculty, the administrators as well as members of the community with people providing input on the qualities they want in a president.

The Academic Search Committee will be sending that profile out nationwide this week to publicize the university's opening for a new president and to see who would be interested in applying for the position, said Academic Search Committee Chairman Joseph Oliverio.

"It is very comprehensive and talks about the requirements that we are looking for as well as the community and demographics of the school and our geographic footprint and more," he said. "If someone from outside the state, who is not familiar with it, can look at that and have a good idea whether they would be a good fit for WVU-P.

"If they apply, then we will figure out if they are a good fit for WVU-P."

Oliverio said they are looking for someone with the knowledge and background with the type of college they are being under the West Virginia Community and Technical College System and the Higher Learning Commission systems for two-year and fouryear institutions with both Associate and Bachelor degree programs and all that requires.

"WVU Parkersburg may be described as a 'hybrid' college in that it is both a community and technical college, as well as a baccalaureate degree-granting college," the profile said. "This hybrid nature is unique to the state, country, and service area.

"Therefore, mission clarification is an important challenge."

The college offers over 50 degree programs, workforce development, short-term career training, and community education classes. They have bachelor and associate degree programs as well as over a dozen certificate programs.

"We are excited with what the profile developed and will let it speak for itself," Oliverio said.

The profile was sent out by Academic Search on Wednesday and applications will be accepted by them through April 10, 2023.

The search committee will narrow down the applicants to semi-finalists and finalists.



Semi-finalists will be interviewed, via Zoom, and a list of finalists will be determined. The finalists who will be brought on campus for in-person interviews.

Oliverio said they are looking at having a president named sometime in May so the person can be in place and ready to start July 1.

Foundations: Higher education continues to adapt and evolve

PARKERSBURG — It's no secret that higher education has changed dramatically in the last 20 years — and even just in the last five years.

From costs increasing drastically, to the introduction and eventual reliance on technology for many aspects of higher education, and to the transition from in-person to online courses during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond, colleges and faculty members have been trying to adjust to the new normal.

Doctor Torie Jackson is the interim president and CEO of West Virginia University at Parkersburg. She believes that technology has had a large role in the evolution of higher education in recent years.



"Advancements in technology have been transformative, and technology can be provided in different formats," she said. "We have learned to adapt and meet learners where they're at."

Jackson also emphasized the importance of higher education institutions communicating with potential employers who are coming to the area for soon-to-begraduates. For example, WVU-P is in talks with economic development authorities to attract tech employers to the area. She also said nurses and teachers are always needed, so WVU-P is always focused on training the next generation of health care professionals and educators.



"We're depending on WVU-P to be a community partner," Jackson added. "We can help train workforce that we need."

When it comes to non-traditional students at WVU-P — say, for example, a plant worker who has lost their job and needs new training, or a mother whose children have graduated high school and wants to go back and get her diploma — Jackson said, "they like to perform at the highest level — like all of our students."



There are also student supports to help every age of student, the tutoring center is free, and there are peer and faculty mentoring options as well.

Jackson also highlighted the re-vamped agribusiness program at WVU-P. Agribusiness involves an academic program which revolves around teaching students about different agricultural fields, like beekeeping and soil health. WVU-P's farm, The Riverhawk Farm, is fully operational and produces many food products. Through a partnership with the university and Mister Bee, the potatoes grown there are even used in Mister Bee potato chips.

When asked what she's proud of the most regarding WVU-P, Jackson said, "I'm most proud of the people who make up WVU-P — students, faculty, and staff."

Andrew Smith, the interim director of the Career Center at Marietta College, believes there has been a dramatic shift in not only what is taught, but how it's taught.

"When I started in about 2010, I thought I was going to lecture like how I was lectured, but I'd only done it for three or four years before I realized the students were changing," Smith said. "That wasn't the way they wanted to learn. I had to adapt my pedagogy."

Smith realized it was crucial to build time in to interact and see how students apply what they're learning.

"Active learning became really important to me," he said.

Smith also acknowledged that student support is a game changer in many cases.

"A big change is outside of the classroom in support services. It felt like you were on your own when I was in school," he said.

"There's a drive for institutions to make sure they're teaching things or redesigning programs to meet market needs," Smith said. "Not every major leads to a specific career at the end," he added.

Smith also emphasized that problem solving skills for all students, regardless of major, are critical in order to find jobs. Students need to develop skills and "competencies" in



order to thrive. One question he says that employers wonder is, "are those students practicing basic problem solving skills?"

Smith also discussed non-traditional students and the importance of colleges understanding and working with the different types of students that enroll.

"Colleges need to adapt to it," he said.

"Being accessible to non traditional students is really important to a lot of colleges," Smith said. "And it's not always going to be a four-year degree. It can be certificates, badges, credentials."

Smith sees lots of opportunity for colleges to grow in different ways once they fully embrace the different types of learners and different kinds of students that attend them.

When asked what Smith hopes for in the future, he replied, "Having worked at colleges in other places, I really hope Marietta College can keep its reputation as a historical college with great students but apply that to a future where students are different.

"Are we offering the best services? I really hope Marietta College focuses on that and delivers the experience that students need."

The Criminal Justice Organization at WVU Parkersburg is working to help kids in foster care through the Carry on Campaign.

The Carry on Campaign is designed to help kids in foster care feel a little more at home.

Criminal Justice Program Coordinator Andrew Walker talked more about the campaign.



"The Carry on Campaign was an initiative that was started back in 2010 by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of West Virginia worked with the Children's Home Society, prosecutors, and a few other groups that work to help children in foster care and children that are removed from homes in an emergency setting like CPS visit," said Walker.

The WVUP Criminal Justice Organization is collecting bags like suitcases and backpacks to make the moves easier for kids.

"A lot of kids in foster care or that are removed during an emergency unfortunately have to carry their belongings in a garbage bag. This campaign is a way to help give them something that's more substantial than a garbage bag. Something that can become their own; to carry their possessions around and to provide them with other things they are going to need," said Walker.

The Criminal Justice Organization are collecting items other than just the bags.

"Suitcases and bags, and things that young people can carry and put things in but also toiletries, stuffed animals, blankets, towels, and that sort of stuff that can help them transition from one place to another," said Walker.

The organization hopes to give more than just the items to the kids.

"Our hope was that we just kind of give them that message that people care about them and that even in a bad situation, there are those that are still willing to help," said Walker.

PARKERSBURG, W.Va. (WTAP) - With Senate Bill 10 – or the Campus Carry Bill – passing the W.Va. House of Delegates, students at West Virginia University at Parkersburg have some differing feelings about this legislation.

Some who are against say they are shocked because of the continued school shootings in the United States.

"It's a little shocking to see," says WVU-Parkersburg student, Zane Lemley. "Because, I mean, I feel like everyone has seen what's kind of happened in schools. Especially over the last few years where school shootings have kind of gone up lately. And you hear about a lot more of them a lot more frequently."

While those who are for it believe that a new method of security could be needed to address school shootings.



"So, instead of continuing to do the same thing by like not allowing guns to be on the campus, maybe it's time to try something else to see if that will prevent some of the school shootings," says WVU-Parkersburg students, Quentin Kennedy.

There are a few provisions to the Campus Carry Bill.

Such as places where faculty members request someone to not practice concealed carry in the offices and any disciplinary or counselor meetings taking place.

"So, they will be able – it appears – to put a sign on their office that would say 'I do not want concealed carry in my office,'" says WVU-Parkersburg interim president, Torie Jackson. "We also could not have it if we were doing counseling or if we were doing some type of student discipline or employee discipline. It wouldn't be allowed in any of those situations as well."

And any place with flammable material or any place that is a shared site with another group.

"Our Caperton Center which houses students that are also a part of Wood County Schools, it would be an off-limit site," says Jackson. "So, nobody there would be able to do concealed carry from what we read from the provisions right now. We also have to look at the provisions to see what it means with our science labs, with our welding facilities. Because there are flammable liquids that are stored in both of those."

Students and faculty will need a concealed carry permit and training.

Jackson says that if Gov. Jim Justice signs this bill that the school will need to look to see what steps need to be taken before the potential enforcement date of July 1, 2024.

PARKERSBURG — The first of several painting parties for the new mural that will surround the entrance to Point Park have started.

Volunteers hoping to become part of something big can go to the Parkersburg Art Center from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 25. Painting parties started Friday afternoon.

The Arts of the MOV and the Parkersburg Art Center have commissioned muralist Nichole Westfall of West Virginia to create a mural for the floodwall on both sides and across the top of the entrance to Point Park.

Westfall's design creates an open feeling to the entrance that can feel narrow for drivers and pedestrians. The design reflects the community gardens of the Greater Parkersburg Convention and Visitors Bureau opening this spring, native birds and other elements of the river and city.



Like the mural on the Parkersburg Art Center wall, this mural starts with 5-by-5 foot pieces of polytab material that have been marked with color codes. Volunteers can help paint this color-coded base layer.

The mural will be completed and applied to the floodwall in early June.

Westfall and her assistant artists were trained in the polytab process by muralist Greta McClain when they assisted her in 2021 with the Good Space mural.

She outlined the pieces of parachute paper and coded them to be painted easily. The paint and paper are UV-protected to stand the test of time.




"It's kind of like wallpaper," Goudy says. "It will last forever. It is a nice way to have permanent art that was made by the community."

"The painters pick a color or a piece of parachute paper they want to work on," Goudy said. "And from there they will pick up a color of paint that correlates with what section they are going to paint."

Once all of the pieces are finished, Westfall planned to take them back to her studio to touch them up and ready them to be applied to the wall.

This project is part of the Arts Collaborative of the Mid-Ohio Valley and is funded by a grant from the City of Parkersburg.
